SIGNS OF A POSSIBLE COMMUNICATION PROBLEM

- Began talking later than expected
- Speech characterized by multiple errors
- Difficulty expressing wants and needs/thoughts and ideas
- Difficulty understanding others and/or following directions
- Difficulty with social communication
- Development of vocabulary/ concepts, grammar and/or sentence structure is delayed
- Hesitations, repetitions or prolongations of sounds, syllables, words or phrases noted in conversational speech
- Appears to have difficulty finding the right words for things

AN OVERVIEW OF SPEECH SERVICES IN DISTRICT 58

Speech and language services are provided for students with an identified impairment in one or more of the following areas: articulation, voice, fluency and or language delay/ disorder, which adversely affects their educational performance. Programs for students in need of speech/language support are located at each District 58 school. The Preschool Itinerant Speech Program is designed for preschool-aged children who are in need of speech/ language support. These services are provided at El Sierra and Henry Puffer.

WHAT TRAINING DO SCHOOL SPEECH PATHOLOGISTS NEED?

- Bachelors and Masters Degree in Speech and Language Pathology and Audiology
- Illinois State Certification and/or Illinois State Licensure

ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF SPEECH PATHOLOGISTS

- Identify students who may need communication assessments
- Assess students' communication skills; identify strength and needs
- Evaluate assessment results to determine students' eligibility for speech and language services
- Develop and implement communication goals for students who qualify for speech and language services as part of the Individualized Education Plan (IEP) process
- Document outcomes of speech and language services for identified students on a scheduled basis.
- Serve as a resource for teachers, support staff and parents to develop and provide interventions

HOW DOES THE SPEECH PATHOLOGIST WORK WITH CHILDREN?

- Collaborates with classroom teachers, staff and parents
- Works with students to address specific speech/communication needs
- Provides speech and language services within the classroom or in the speech office
- Combines communication goals with academic and/or social goals
- Integrates speech and language activities with classroom curriculum
- Facilitates students' understanding and use of speech and language concepts
